Course on Organising and Mobilising Rural Poor for Self-Help and Empowerment (15-20, August 2011)

NEED:

It is difficult to bring about sustainable socio-economic changes in the situation of the poor people in today's economy. The forces against the poor are so many and the social system so biased in favour of the rich that it would not respond to the demands of the poor people. In the economy, the various forces that work against the poor are highly organized. To overcome the constraints and effectively use the space, that is, to be empowered, it is necessary for poor people to organize and mobilize themselves.

As atomized and isolated individuals, the poor are too weak, powerless and lack the capacity to take individual initiatives to improve their conditions. They often tend to accept the status quo as their fate. Human creativity lies dormant in people who live in poverty and derivation. Mainstream development processes could not only by-pass the atomized poor but sometimes harm them by making them victims rather than beneficiaries of development. Organization is to provide a continuing mechanism for the pursuit of the interests of its members as collectively identified by them. Organization is essentially a means of empowering the poor to enable them to deal with the problems and issues of their poverty. Organizations can serve as an instrument to mobilize people's own resources for projects, which could satisfy a wide variety of people's needs.

The goal of community organizing is people's empowerment. Through community organizing people learn to overcome their powerlessness and develop their capacity to maximize their control over their lives. They must be able to influence the course of history and erode the dehumanizing effects of powerlessness. And through the process of social mobilization for confronting oppressive structures and institutions, people are transformed from dehumanized objects into human beings with dignity, who can assert their rights, work for self-help and can control their destiny.

This training programme aims to impart knowledge, skills and attitudes that are necessary for organizing and mobilizing rural poor for self-help and empowerment.

Programme Objectives

- 1) To understand the socio-economic, political and psychological dimensions of the rural poor;
- 2) To critically examine the knowledge, skills and attitudes that are

necessary for organizing the mobilizing rural poor for self-help and empowerment

- 3) To understand the nature of the socio-economic context in which poor people's organization operates, the specific interests that a particular group seeks to pursue, and level of consciousness attained by the members of the group concerned:
- 4) To critically examine the various models for empowering the rural poor, and measuring empowerment
- 5) To understand the concept, steps and methods for social mobilization.

- Understanding causes and factors of poverty.
- Understanding socio-economic, political, and psychological dimensions of poor people.
- The goal, context and process of community organizing and group formation

- Social mobilization; concept, steps, and processes.

Training Methodology:

The training methods and techniques will include Lecture/discussions, panel discussions, simulation exercises and group discussion, experience sharing through participation, audio-visual presentation.
